The Great Testing Debate: Regardless of what our opinions are about standardized testing, they have always been a part of our educational process and most likely will continue in some form or another. Students will be taking the test between April 27th and May 22nd. Testing will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursdays between 8:15 and noon. It is vitally important that all students in grades 3-6 be at school and on time during this time period. Opportunities for make-up sessions will be very limited! It is expected that each student will have about 6-8 hours of testing over that time period. The CAASPP is an online test that involves performance tasks that include classroom discussions prior to the assessment portion. Gone are the multiple choice questions, and in their place are multiple step questions that involve writing and critical thinking skills. In addition, (continued page 2)

the test is aligned with the new common core standards. Parents will receive individual student test results; however, scores will not be used to rate schools this year.

If you want to become a science engineer he says that you can take however many years of schooling that you want, even forever. Some classes are physics, maybe fundamental science, and math.


